Gospel reading set for today: Luke 13 v 1 – 9





Message from a Circuit friend

I believe it was at the turn of the century that the Revised Common Lectionary came into being, and every three years the readings are repeated. The set readings for today, however, seem particularly relevant to the days we are living in now. Psalm 63, thought to have been written by David in the desert of Judah, brings to mind the people of the besieged cities of Ukraine who are being denied water and essential supplies. Isaiah offers water to those who are thirsty, and adds the promise that foreign nations will come to the aid of His people. He also points out that we cannot always understand what God is doing or why. Jesus, in Luke's gospel, says that we cannot assume that disasters are God's judgement on those who are most wicked.

Paul, writing to the Christians in Corinth, warns that just belonging to a nation does not guarantee any privileges, it is our behaviour in response to Christ, which brings us salvation.

If we were in a situation where our home was being destroyed and we needed to shelter in an underground bunker, if our country was invaded and we needed to escape to another one, would we be able to praise God for His constant love? Would we remember that God's hand would always keep us safe? If we were cold and hungry and far from home in those foreign lands, would we be confident that God is not judging us, or that He will judge our enemies?

In this period of Lent we are made aware of our need to give for those who have lost so much and our need to pray for peace in the world and in the lives of individuals.
