Message from a Circuit Friend

There are many thousands of people, from early civilisations to now, who have observed the night sky. Nowadays, with the aid of powerful telescopes, astronomers can draw our attention to rare cosmic events. A few years ago, Jupiter and Saturn came closer together. (The next time this should happen will be in 2040) There have been suggestions that this was what happened when the Magi saw the bright star and followed it until they found the Christ-child. The Gospel writer is not interested in astronomy nor in stargazing, but in showing the realization of God's love, demonstrated in the gift of His son, not just to the chosen few but for all humankind. Sometimes this is difficult for people to believe, especially in our world which is so divided and broken. God wants barriers of age, skin colour, gender and social status broken down, no matter who we are or what we have done or failed to do. God's love in Jesus Christ is for us all. This is what we celebrate at Epiphany, the revelation of His all-encompassing love beyond any barriers we may impose. If we ponder for a moment that meeting of the Magi and the Christ-child. These prosperous wealthy men kneeling and offering their gifts to Him, a child born in humble circumstances, but they fell to their knees in awe and wonder and worshipped Him. It was the only response they could make, confronted with the reality of God's immense love. Their stay ends and they go home. Have you, like me, wondered what they talked about, getting the better of Herod and the brightness of the star? You can imagine them speaking in hushed whispers recalling their joy and awe as they knelt before the Christ-child. It was all we could do they said. He was a child and yet a king and it is to Him, who is King of Kings and Lord of Lords, that we too bow down in worship and offer our thanks and praise.
