### Message from a Circuit Friend

Today is the third Sunday in Lent - nearly halfway through our journey to Easter. When you're on a long- distance walk the half- way mark is encouraging and we're tempted to think 'all downhill from now on!' Our readings today encourage us to reflect on our attitude to The Rules. Our OT reading has the giving of the Ten Commandments. In the old little red communion books we used to regularly read the 10 Commandments as part of the Communion Service. It preceded the prayer of confession. The inference is that even if we try really hard, we will break the rules at some point. In the gospel reading, we have people who are technically following the rules but doing it in such a way that it puts a barrier between people and God. At this point in our Lenten journey, take a moment to consider your attitude to rules? Are there some you are happy to or used to breaking? (I'm thinking of the 20mph or 30mph speed limits!!) Can we break some unintentionally, or just by being careless? Or are you a stickler for keeping to ALL the rules? Are there some more important than others?

The hymn 'Help us, O Lord, to learn' is helpful. In verse one we ask God to help us to study so that the laws are written on our hearts. In verse 2, we move on - if the laws are on our hearts, may our thoughts and words and deeds all bring glory to God. And vs 3 shows us that the next step is to teach others that all may find Christ and make a life of praise. That's surely why the rules are there - to help us on our journey with Christ and to Christ.
