
Sunday 10th March 2024: Fourth Sunday in Lent and Mothering Sunday

Message from a Circuit Friend

Today is Mothering Sunday not 'Mothers Day'. 'Mothers Day' has a very different meaning. I could speak about the history of Mothering Sunday, but this is about today, a very different world! On Mothering Sunday we look at the care of not only mothers, but of families and all sorts of people who are caring for children, creating loving and safe environments.

Throughout the Bible there are many accounts of love and bravery and sacrifice around children by various people, in different circumstances. In the account of Moses there are 4 prominent women in his life. The midwife Shiphrah, Moses mother Jochebed, his sister Miriam, and Pharaoh's daughter. All these women paid an important role in his life, and if not for them and their love bravery and care he would not have survived. In Samuel we read of Hannah, childless for so many years, then having a son whom she took to the Temple and gave him for the Lords service, to be brought up by the community of the Temple. In the New Testament we have the unexpected baby for Elizabeth and Zechariah in their old age, and of course, the other unexpected pregnancy of Mary, conceiving the expected Messiah. All recorded from their birth. This was just the start of God's future plans. God had guided these different people to help nurture and care for them making them the great people they were to become, the greatest of all God's only Son.

Relationships concerning 'mothering' can be magnificent, difficult, glorious or troubling, - sometimes heartbreaking. But there is no doubt that mothers, and we mustn't forget fathers, and other carers in this role, take up a powerful life changing calling that profoundly shapes lives.
