Message from a Circuit Friend

I have been talking all through Lent (in services that I have taken) about the interesting dating of Easter this year. Easter is early because the first full moon after the Spring equinox was on 25th March and thus the first Sunday after that is today. Ash Wednesday (the beginning of Lent of course) was on 14th February – Valentine's Day. The last time this happened was in 2018 but, before that, not since 1945. The next occasion will be in 2029. These other years bring Easter Day in on 1st April (April Fool's Day) but not this year – because of the extra day with the leap year. How strange that the juxtaposition of Lent beginning on Valentine's Day and ending on April Fool's Day should occur 3 times in 11 years (except that it hasn't this year as explained!) but that there were 6 decades without it occurring at all... Our world, indeed, universe, is mysterious and wonderful. There are always so many things that we don't understand. Including, of course, the death and resurrection of Jesus. Why was it necessary for Jesus to suffer so horribly? Indeed, why was it necessary for God to be a human being at all, and why did he have to die? Having died, the only way out of it was for him to come back to life – and the way he did so was on the one hand dramatic and, on the other hand, forcefully out of sight... in heaven, everything will be made clear. In the meantime, perhaps we should reflect on the juxtaposition of the day when Love holds centre stage, with the day when we celebrate the Fool. The ending of Lent in selected years draws our attention to the apparent foolishness of the gospel which, after all, turns out to be an amazing display of supernatural wisdom and strength. I will leave the last word to St Paul: "We preach Christ crucified: a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those whom God has called....Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength."
