Message from a Circuit Friend

Although we have moved on from Easter Day in the Gospel reading, it is still the day of resurrection. We find the disciples huddled together, behind locked doors, too terrified to venture out despite the news from Mary That Jesus had risen. No locked door will stop the risen Christ. Suddenly he appears among them, there are so many things he could have said to them; 'where were you? Why did you leave me? Why are you hiding here?' But gracious as always, his greeting is 'Peace be with you'. Then he breathes the Holy Spirit on them, commissioning them to go and spread the Good News of the risen Christ. However, one disciple was missing, Thomas. When they tell him they have seen Jesus, he can't believe it and waits until he has seen the scars on Jesus' body for himself. The resurrection is a God event and it's in God's very nature to do surprising and new things.

They are all there a week after and Jesus comes again and gives his individual attention to Thomas and invites him to see and touch. Thomas makes a huge leap in his faith, not only does he see and believe, but he also makes the proclamation 'My Lord and my God'. He was the first disciple to do this. His doubting led to a firm and committed faith. We should never underestimate the place of searching and questioning in our journey with Christ. The risen Christ comes to us each and every day through scripture, through the witness of others and through prayer. We are blessed because although we have never seen him, we believe. He comes to squash our doubts and still our fears. Christ comes to mould us into a loving community where all people are equal. He comes to surprise, to make us think again, to disturb our complacency.
