## **Message from a Circuit Friend**

Often we forget that the Bible only gives us snapshots of events not the complete story. Imagine how many other things Jesus said and did that we know nothing about (John 21 v 25).

To understand Paul's dealings with the rather troublesome church at Corinth we need to look for clues especially in 2 Corinthians and combine them with Acts 18 which gives a clearer picture. False apostles and teachers with a sense of their own importance had taken a hold in the Corinthian church and were belittling the ministry and teaching of Paul. His appearance and oratory were considered unimpressive (2) Cor 10 v 10). Paul wrote 2 Corinthians to counteract them. Today's passage gives us two intriguing insights into Paul's life. Paul is not keen to boast of his achievements (unlike others) as he feels everything he has achieved is Jesus working through him not from his own abilities. None the less he wants to explain that he had a special insight into God's plan in his 'out of body' experience. The third heaven was thought of as above the heavens over the earth. A place where God resided. Today we often see the expression 'asking for a friend' on social media when we know it's the writer asking. Paul similarly doesn't want to boast and uses the expression 'I know a man'. After Paul's experience on the road to Damascus in AD 35 he spent 3 'silent' years in Arabia, no doubt praying and working out his 'theology' before we hear of him again at the start of his ministry. Possibly the experience Paul describes happened then or perhaps a little later, but it left a profound lifetime impression on him which strengthened him through his life. Perhaps we can all think of events that have left us with a lasting sense of God's presence. When Paul mentions his 'thorn in the flesh' it shows us his humanity. We can all empathise. Was it a physical or spiritual problem or perhaps the false teachers themselves? Either way Paul had a problem and praying did not remove it. What it did however was bring him to a realisation that it made him turn to God not his own abilities. As it says in v 9 'My grace is sufficient for you for my power is made perfect in weakness'. The whole message is summed up in a line from one of my favourite modern worship songs: 'Yet not I but though Christ in me'.
