## **Message from a Circuit Friend**

Have you ever stood outside a bakery where bread is actually baked? The smell is gorgeous and appetising, much more attractive than standing by a supermarket shelf. Perhaps some other countries have something to teach us here! Jesus probably had this in mind (not the supermarket bit) when he described himself as the Bread of Life. Bread is essential to life. Producing it involves a lot of hard work from sowing the seed, gathering in the crop, threshing and then milling the grain, preparing the dough (including allowing time for it to rise), and finally baking the loaves. Even then it is best eaten promptly. Providing this most basic of foods requires a great deal of planning, effort, coping with issues outside our control (e.g. a poor growing season). Jesus' hearers would seen immediately the significance of what he was saying – namely that he is essential to a full life, as bread is to a full diet. It didn't go down very well with the people of his day who saw it as a challenge to their way of life rather than a fulfilment of it. What's changed? If we go to a large bakery today we are confronted with a very wide range of different bread products – white, brown, 50/50, granary in various formats etc., and that's before we start thinking of gluten free. When I was a small boy (when bread, like everything else, was rationed) the choice was simpler – large, small or, for those then considered slightly odd, brown. (I'm even old enough to remember when sliced bread first appeared!) This perhaps highlights a problem we have today. It's all very well proclaiming Jesus as the Bread of Life but which variety do we choose? The growth of online offerings following Covid has exacerbated this situation. The evangelist, Canon J. John describes it as Buffet Christianity. Buffets are fine and can be great fun, but choose wisely. Let us not just look at Jesus but take action.
