### The truth is revealed

## A message from a Circuit Friend

#### 'The truth of power or the power of truth'

The events around the recent election in the USA are a reminder of the great power held by world leaders. Apart from the political issues, it seems incredible that the leadership of one of the most powerful nations in the word will change hands and much has been said about the peaceful transition of power.

Here before Pilate, Jesus represents a power and a Kingdom that transcends all earthly power.

Pilate asks the question "Are you the King of the Jews?" Here we have the most powerful military and political power then on earth, through Pilate, confronted by a power which they have no hope of comprehending. The answer to his question is yet another question.

Where is this suggestion coming from? Is it yours or someone else's idea? Did Pilate expect a poor frightened man pleading for his life? He was not expecting to be confronted by such calm and assured confidence in the truth. Jesus makes it clear his Kingdom is not from this earth. He declares that he is the truth and everyone on the side of truth follows him. Pilate condemns himself through his lack of understanding of this concept when he asks, "What is truth?" He betrays the earthly political understanding that 'truth' is what you say it is, not the pure undeniable truth reflected in our Lord Jesus Christ, a truth that could save all who are prepared to follow.
