Reflection


Do you look forward to new programmes on television? Or do you prefer the old films, or repeats of classic comedies, and other shows. It's not always bad to see programmes over and over again, or to read books again. They can often still be meaningful, even if they're not really fresh anymore. The scripture readings we hear in church, or read at home, are essentially 'repeats'; we've heard them all before, and they become part of us. It was the same for the people in the synagogue, listening to Jesus read from the prophet Isaiah. Did the people really take in the words, or did it just wash over them in its familiarity? They were perhaps more focused on the 'preacher', fascinated by this 'local boy' returning home after gaining popularity elsewhere. As he began to speak on the passage, all eyes were on him, not their ears, necessarily. But his first words were a startling statement, which got their attention. "Today, this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing". This was a very personal announcement that, "The Spirit of the Lord is on me".

When Jesus read the passage, he was not just reading it but enacting it. The word had become flesh. He was not just telling people but giving a challenge to all who listened. In the verses that follow, we find the people could not accept his words. They didn't expect familiar scriptures to come to life in a new way. This was only the beginning of God's gracious fulfilment of his promise through the prophet; to them, to us and to the world. The words of freedom and release, began with Jesus in person, who would call others to continue the work through his church. We can all use our gifts, that the scriptures may be fulfilled in the present day. When we hear the Word of God, it is not a repeat, but fresh every time, always a personal, present and gracious word from God to us; for the 'Word of God is living and active'.

- Thinking about what Elsie has said, when you hear the opening words of a familiar passage of scripture, do you switch off? Or do you listen intently, waiting to hear something new that God is saying to you?
- "All their eyes were upon him" the person reading the word of God can be as important as the word itself. Have you heard a familiar passage and been inspired by the reader?
- Do you ever make a note of Bible readings and look at how different translations interpret the word. If using
