Reflection:

Today when we need medical help, we go to the doctor or hospital, even though we may have to wait a while for an appointment or treatment. In the time of Jesus, it was quite different, especially if you suffered from a skin disease known as leprosy. Afflicted people were considered unclean and banished from their communities. The only way to return to society was to be declared 'clean' by a priest. The ten lepers in the passage, had heard that Jesus could heal, and when he was travelling nearby, they came as close as they could, and called to him for help. Jesus did not ignore them but simply said: 'Go to the priest'. Desperate for relief, they immediately obeyed. To their amazement, they discovered their skin was healed and carried on eagerly to the priest.

I think we can identify with them in a way. If we have been healed, or a condition has improved, we would feel relief and joy and quickly resume our normal way of life. It's natural, and just what those men did. But, with a twist in the tale, one man came back to Jesus, loudly praising God, kneeling at his feet with profuse thanks. But not only that, he was the most unlikely person to do so, for he was a 'foreigner', a despised Samaritan!

It reminded me of the recent tension between Norwich City and Ipswich Town football fans, when one of the Norwich players left, and signed for Ipswich. It was unthinkable! Jesus, however, was delighted, for he saw that the Samaritan had faith – he saw beyond the cultural and religious barriers and realized just how much he needed to give thanks.

He had called to Jesus in trust and now responded with respect and thanksgiving. Jesus disregarded the barriers and gave the man much more than healing. 'Rise and go', he said, giving him a new life of wholeness in all respects. I wonder how much we suffer needlessly, by holding onto the barriers that divide us: from other people who may be different to us; holding back from coming to Jesus in faith; by neglecting to return to God time and time again, in thanksgiving for all he has given us.
