Reflection

Testimony is one of those things that we consider to be highly important to our faith, but in practice, we don't always do it. I often find listening to someone's testimony and how they have encountered God to be more impactful than a sermon. We hear stories about people's lives that we may not have heard before and we see how God has played a role in their life. It can make our faith more alive, more relevant, and we see how others have 'done it' before, showing a way forward. The Gospel stories are also testimony, in a sense. Of people making sense of who this person, Jesus, was (and is!), how to understand it and communicate it to others, and how to make sense of him being the Christ and our Saviour. In our reading, we have Jesus speaking of John the Baptist, who gave his testimony about God and what was going to happen. Jesus also tells the disciples of John the Baptist to go to him and give their testimony about Jesus. So, in this, I thought I would share some of my testimony.

Some will know from my testimony service before my ordination last year that I haven't had an easy life: experiencing a traumatic and adverse childhood, which followed me into adulthood with bad mental health, homelessness and joblessness, and more. Aspects of my life have continued to be hard, with the indelible effects from my childhood creating difficulty, along with some very challenging experiences arising throughout the past few years. Furthermore, I have spent much of this year unwell, with symptoms starting in April and my condition worsening at the end of August and requiring time off. I am still not 100% and I am still waiting for hospital appointments and answers.

My question is this: Where is God in all of this struggle? With my body feeling like it is letting me down, with many people in my life letting me down, and more. The Church, too, has let me down at various times. I know some people experience God's presence all the more in these times, but I do not. I experience God best when there is life and energy, creativity and goodness, community and joy. So when things are hard, I do not feel God, and it can be challenging to hold onto the fact that God is there. Yet, I still know that, despite the flaws of people and our institutions, despite the imperfect life I have led and experienced, and despite not sending God, God is with me.

One of the names or titles we give Jesus Christ is Immanuel, God with us. I often go back to this name because it is central to my understanding of God. God is with us, Jesus Christ is with us. Throughout my whole life, Jesus Christ has been with me, suffering with me, celebrating with me, and everything in between! I may not feel God's presence all the time, especially when things are

hard. Sometimes I even doubt. For me, doubt has rarely been about whether God is or is not, but more about what God desires for me and others. Also, I do not see doubt as the enemy of faith because we can allow it to help us think and consider, if we engage with it rather than allow it to swallow us up. However, this does not prevent God from being with me.

I experience God best in connecting with others, of sharing with them; recently this has been in the support I have received from others. Seb has been a tremendous support for me, I have been uplifted by people's prayers for me, the cards and messages sent to me, the welcome I received from them when I returned to work. These are tangible signs of God's presence, signs of the love of the Spirit flowing through and in people. This is one of the best ways for me to experience God – being in community. In the New Testament and in theology, there is a word for this: *koinonia*. It means community, sharing life with each other, participating with each other. This is the work of the Spirit of Christ in us, when we share and generate goodness through this sharing. Typically by reconnecting with others and reconnecting with myself through things that bring me joy, such as painting, sharing a good meal, etc. One thing that often prevents me from returning to God, or, rather, reconnecting with God, is by making myself feel bad for being disconnected. Shame and guilt do not assist me here! Furthermore, a part of this sharing, participating and reconnecting needs us to bring ourselves, including our stories, 'warts and all'.

This means not only being 'fine' and 'okay' when we are in church, but also allowing ourselves and others to bring the other parts of our lives. The parts that are misshapen, sharp, weak, sore, and vulnerable. If we are to speak of how God works in our lives with integrity, we must be sincere and compassionate in doing so. Through this, we show the fuller picture of how God has worked with us and in us, and we show others that they are not alone in their pain, doubt, struggle, and difficulty. I am not always great at doing this – I often prefer to smile and laugh. This is a mix of being actually happy when I do so, as well as a way to keep going. To be vulnerable is scary a lot of the time!

God is with us, even if we do not feel it or know it. I have shared a bit of my struggle with this, as well as some of the ways I experience God well. Through sharing and participating in each other's lives, that *koinonia* stuff, we experience a tangible workings of God's Spirit in our lives. I pray that through sharing my testimony, you are able to go and do likewise; that is, to explore where God has been and is at work in your life. I also hope that by sharing some of the more vulnerable parts of me, I have shown that things don't have to be 'perfect' or 'right' to be able to follow Christ – you are already completely loved by God and nothing we can do will affect this. In this love, God is with you, with each of us. Our Immanuel.
