



Sunday 28th December 2025: First Sunday after Christmas Theme for today is "New Beginnings" Prepared by Jacky Woor – Local Preacher

Come, by your Spirit, we pray, and open our hearts and minds to your grace.





Reflection by Jacky Woor:

When did we learn of this unique event which happened that night? For most of us it will have been in School or Sunday School, from teachers who would have been very knowledgeable in the story. But how do children, or adults for that matter, learn today? I find myself thinking about the many places in the world today that do not seem to be hearing the Good News, the coming of God's Son, to a lowly maiden and a manual labourer. A child visited by the lowest of the low (the shepherds) and the magnificent wise men (however many there were).

This was a new beginning, not one that was to have an immediate effect, but one that would rock the world in time to come. That night had seen the birth of a special child, one who was to grow up into a very special man, God's only begotten Son. Until he began his ministry only those who had been at Bethlehem during that first Christmas realized the importance of this baby's birth.

Maybe even they forgot over the coming years, until they heard of the new radical preacher/teacher who was travelling around their country. To everyone else he was just a baby born in strange circumstances, just a child growing in a normal family, doing what all children do as they grow and learn.

Perhaps for many people even today he is still just an ordinary baby, born in a stable, going no further, staying a baby. But what they miss is the whole point of that first Christmas, that in that birth, came God's salvation for all people. Jesus grew, he developed into a man, he worked for a living just like the rest of us, he cared for his parents, his brothers and sisters, only leaving all when he began his ministry in his 30s. Yes that first Christmas night saw the new beginning, the fulfillment of all the prophesies in the OT. And Mary pondered on all that happened and kept them in her heart.
