Reflection

Matthew we are told wrote his Gospel for a Jewish readership, and here is the wonderful revelation that God's love and Kingdom is not just for Abraham's descendants but for the whole world. Abraham had been told that all the world would be blessed through his people, but that bit had got lost down the years, and by the time Jesus came Messiah was seen as exclusively for the "Chosen People". So, Matthew puts it straight, Jesus is for everyone, and shock horror, God is quite happy communicating with receptive people who are not Jews! Maybe Christians need to think about that too!

It is also Covenant Sunday introduced to the Methodist people by John Wesley. So, we read what the prophet Jeremiah said: Jeremiah $31 \vee 31 - 34$

Reflection

That first Covenant with Abraham was revolutionary. At a time when everyone worshipped a god of some sort, Abraham had become aware of that "Other" as someone who spoke to him and who would listen to him, and with whom he could have a relationship, and even more a relationship of love and trust. He was the pioneer of our faith. But that relationship had got lost down the years and had become ritualised, codified and mechanical- more like ticking boxes. Jeremiah saw this and tells of a restoring if the original intention, not ticking boxes but a living relationship, and later on that is exactly what Jesus did at the cost of his life. But it was that relationship that kick started the Church. In the 18th century the Church was in a sorry state and that was when John Wesley did a Jeremiah, he called his followers to make their own Covenant Relationship with God. I remember vividly, when I was 14, our minister preaching on this amazing Idea that the incomprehensible Power that kick started the Creation should want to come into relationship with part of the Creation, and that we should presume to take him up on it! But that is the wonderful meaning of the Covenant Service:

"I am no longer my own but yours. Your will, not mine, be done in all things, wherever you may place me, in all that I do and in all that I may endure; when there is work for me and when there is none; when I am troubled and when I am at peace. Your will be done when I am valued and when I am disregarded; when I find fulfilment and when it is lacking; when I have all things, and when I have nothing. I willingly offer all I have and am to serve you, as and where you choose. Glorious and blessed God, Father Son and Holy Spirit, you are mine and I am yours. May it be so for ever. Let this covenant now made on earth be fulfilled in heaven. Amen".

This Covenant is renewed every year by Methodists and other Christians around the world.
