Minister's Letter

Dear Friends,

As I start this letter, I am reflecting on everything that has happened over the last three months since I wrote to you. It was good to welcome Neil, Lynn and Alex into our Circuit with a lovely service at Swaffham on Thursday 4th September. Sadly Jonny has been very ill since the beginning of September and has been off on sick leave, his road to recovery is still a long one and I'm sure that you will join me in remembering him in our prayers and wishing him a speedy recovery.

It is important that I thank you for all your prayers for Karen and I while she has been ill. Thankfully she is now back home and is doing fine, but is completely dependent on the family and a stream of carers who are coming in throughout the day. We have been told that it could be several months before she can walk again even at the speed she was doing earlier in the year, so there is still quite a hill to climb.

As we set out on the new Church year in September I was full of enthusiasm to change the narrative of the Circuit from "we are predominantly elderly, with very little money and nobody to do the essential jobs" to a more missional approach of "what can we do and well and how can the circuit support the local churches when they need it". We have already started to take action and in the summer we decided to restructure the Circuit Leadership Team to give a focussed approach to

- Worship
- · Learning and caring
- Service
- Evangelism

We also decided that as we have several vulnerable churches and whilst closure might be the right move in some places, there might be a more creative approach, so, we added a fifth prong - Missional development.

Of course we are not neglecting the vital work of admin, finance and property.

At the same time we are working with a connexional advisor to look at the possibilities with some of our buildings, so watch out for more on this. With the challenges we have faced during September and October progress has been much slower than anticipated, but we will plod on into the New year

Nature in Norfolk

I'm writing this as the weather turns autumnal and light levels are reduced. This drives the change in the colour of deciduous tree leaves, though some trees were stressed by earlier heat and drought and turned brown early. But this year we've had a bumper crop of fruit and berries for both us and wildlife to enjoy. Yesterday I saw the Dartmoor ponies on Holt Lowes browsing on sweet chestnuts, too interested in eating to move off the path. Heather still has some colour on our heathland which contrasts with the last of the summer flowering gorse. There is also a winter flowering gorse - hence the old saying 'when gorse is out of blossom kissing is out of fashion'.

I saw the first of this autumn's Pink Foot Geese in early September when they arrived from Iceland, Greenland and Spitzbergen where they breed. I didn't hear their call as they flew over Holt until three weeks later. They would have been flying inland looking for sugar beet fields, they eat the beet tops that are left after harvesting.

On October 1st I took a very slow bike ride from the woods on Selbrigg Road, High Kelling eventually reaching Kelling campsite and heath. I was looking for fungi and found several species as I explored paths that wandered here, there and round in circles. I took a lot of photos as you can see but there was only one, the Fly agaric, I could definitely identify. It is poisonous so don't touch it as you peer underneath looking for those elves that definitely make it their home! The golden rule is "Never eat fungi you cannot identify with certainty". Look and leave for others to enjoy.

For almost a year, The Hive has been taking its creativity, spirituality and well-being sessions to Blakeney Methodist Church where a fellowship of 15 to 20 people has gathered on a monthly basis to chat, explore, discover and share in The Hive's now well-established style.



Starting in December 2024 with a re-telling of the Christmas Story, and mirroring the very first event at The Hive in Great Cressingham in December 2020, the church soon filled with the remaining members of the congregation, local people and seasonal visitors. Rev. Jonny welcomed and shared a Christmastide thought and carols were sung to musical accompaniment provided by Sarah and Geraldine.

From conversations during the refreshments that followed, it was clear that a monthly event at Blakeney Methodist Church would be warmly welcomed and so the programme was set in train.

Running The Hive 'Pop-ups' at Blakeney meant a considerable commitment from The Hive team - Sarah, Geraldine, David and Susan - beginning with an energetic tidying of the front garden which had been laid out by Sam and Angela in the days when the Blakeney café flourished. It also involved ferrying a fair bit of equipment from Great Cressingham to Blakeney and back again for each monthly event. Early arrival to open up, clean up, heat up, boil up was also an essential part of the process!

The programme drew on the resources of previous gatherings at The Hive in Great Cressingham and gave the Blakeney fellowship plenty of opportunity to enjoy a range of presentations and activities, all with the core purposes of creativity, spirituality and well-being in mind. The extra session in May meant that the students from Cliff College who were on placement at The Hive, could bring to life their faith-based thoughts, ideas and messages. Having already learnt from sessions at Great Cressingham, Korben and Evie made their contributions in The Hive way by encouraging participation and using poetry, music and art as pathways to spiritual engagement.

Memorable occasions were David's presentation on Climate Change, Rev. Jonny's Let's Talk About It session on Neurodiversity, Geraldine and Sarah's performance of Music for Body, Mind and Soul and the Open Play-reading of The Wind in the Willows, which revealed some unexpected readers who brought Ratty, Mole, Badger and of course, Mr Toad, animatedly to

life!



It was a bitter-sweet conclusion to the 10 visits we made to Blakeney with The Hive Pop-up but we are more than happy to have been able to extend the spiritual life of the Church and to maintain a continuing Methodist presence in this beautiful North Norfolk village.

The question remains as to what may now become of the church and its heritage. The Repurposing Group of the Circuit Leadership Team is working hard to discern a future for Blakeney Methodist Church and asks for your thoughts and prayers.

I know those who were part of the Blakeney pop-up fellowship would want to thank the team from The Hive, together with Jonny and Seb Bell for a brief but rather beautiful episode in the life of Blakeney Methodist Church and it is good to be able to have this on record in The Link.



Zacchaeus by Andrew Fielding


Climbing the tree

News from Walsingham




30thOn the 'Wells' Catholic August organised congregation an ecumenical pilgrimage as part of their year of Jubilee. An initiative set up by the late Pope Francis to celebrate this year as a jubilee. A request to use Walsingham Methodist as one of the stopping places. The idea was to walk from Wells to Walsingham stopping 21 times to read a chapter of St John's Gospel at each place.

The invitation was also for anyone to join in the walk and in a fit of enthusiasm I agreed to walk. By car it is not far, but schedule in all the churches in Wells, the town cemetery, the Quaker and Congregational burial areas then the country paths to Wighton, the miles start to stack up. On the way to Wighton we stopped several times looking out at the fields and the landscape. Apart from the odd bike rider the main sound was the birds.

A bit self-conscious at first a rhythm soon established with volunteers reading a different chapter. We stopped at Wighton cemetery, avoided with difficulty water across the track and then into the outskirts of Wighton and up the slope to the imposing Parish Church. Inside there is a model of the Church which was originally in Wighton Methodist (commissioned by a past member) when it was open as a Chapel before closing and becoming the Heritage Centre.



Here there was an opportunity to sit and listen before moving onwards to the main village. A stop here for lunch and quite a few made use of a fellow walker's garden with chairs and other facilities including hot drinks. The others who had stopped in the village for refreshments were encouraged to walk up the hill and join us in the garden and to read another chapter of the gospel before setting off again for Walsingham. At this point others joined us and we were a good friendly crowd journeying onto Walsingham. One person who walked with us was Cynthia a former member of Wighton Methodist and she walked a mile or so with us before returning back home.



The sounds of music and laughter could be heard from Walsingham where the annual Rock on the rec fundraising was taking place in aid of the village hall rebuilding fund. As we reached Walsingham itself we stopped at the Catholic Sisters House, into the Anglican Shrine grounds, and then on to Gt Walsingham to the Orthodox Church (a former Methodist Chapel). Here we paused to read another chapter and then received a blessing from the Orthodox Priest. Onwards to St Peters Anglican crossing the ford by the footpath bridge, then round to St Mary's Anglican and then chapter number 20 inside Walsingham Methodist. What a privilege to read again to my new friends. They loved the chapel many had not been inside before.

And finally on to the area outside the Chapel of the Annunciation in Friday Market Place. We started at Wells Methodist at 10am and finished at 6pm 10 miles in total with around a 45minute break for lunch.

It was a great day and it was wonderful to share with people of different denominations.
